#### **PRAYER**

**Hon. Speaker** (Hon. N. Mutai): What is your issue Hon. Cecilia?

**Hon. C. Mutai:** Hon. Speaker, Sir, allow me to take this opportunity to wish all the women in this Republic and in our county a happy International Women's day as we mark and celebrate the milestones made by women in this country that has brought about the changes and all the successes that we have had. Even though as women we still feel that there are a lot that needs to be done and that there is a bigger space that we need to fight for.

Hon. Speaker, let me quote the Chief Justice that any job that demines women is an abuse and to this House, I appreciate the fact that we have received support although there are still more that we can do together to ensure that women get their rights. Hon. Speaker, thank you.

**Hon. Speaker** (Hon. N. Mutai): Hon. Serbai.

**Hon. R. Serbai:** Hon. Speaker, Sir, as we celebrate the work done by women, let us be careful so that we do not go the wrong way. We used to advocate for girl child education, but currently we are advocating for boy child education because the boy child is now endangered.

Hon. Speaker, Sir, one question I would like to ask is, for the ten years that we have been in the Assembly, what Bill has it been enacted in this County Assembly to show that we are fighting for women? There is only one for the youth and none for women. I urge those representing women to come up with Bills that support women. You can come up with a Women Enterprise Fund that can assist women doing business in our towns. That is how we can assist our women. Hon. Speaker, thank you.

**Hon. Speaker** (Hon. N. Mutai): Good observation there, Hon. R. Serbai.

## **MOTION**

**Hon. Speaker** (Hon. N. Mutai): Hon. Haron Kirui.

**Hon. H. Kirui:** Hon. Speaker, Sir, thank you. I rise to move the following Motion:

THAT, pursuant to Standing Order 190 (3) (b) this County Assembly adopts the report of the Committee on the Budget and Appropriation of the Bomet County Executive First Supplementary Budget Estimates for the Financial Year 2021/ 2022 laid on the Table of the Assembly on Tuesday, 1<sup>st</sup> March 2022 and pursuant to Section 135 of the Public Finance Management Act, 2012 approves the Bomet County Executive First Supplementary Budget Estimates for the Financial Year 2021/ 2022.

Hon. Speaker, Sir, I take this opportunity on behalf of the Members of the Committee on Budget and Appropriation to present to the Assembly the Committee's report of the Bomet County Executive First Supplementary Budget Estimates for the Financial Year 2021/ 2022 as per Section 135 of the Public Finance Management Act, 2012 and in accordance with the County Assembly Standing Orders.

Hon. Speaker, Sir, the Committee on Budget and Appropriation as currently constituted comprises of thirteen (13) members and the House clearly knows the mandate of the Committee.

In line with the constitution and the PFM Act, the 1<sup>st</sup> Supplementary Budget Estimates for the County Executive was submitted and Tabled before this House went on recess. There is therefore a need to dispense with the issue to avoid being overtaken by events.

Hon. Speaker, Sir, in reviewing the proposed supplementary budget, the committee managed to obtain clarifications and the views of the County Executive Member of Finance. The views enable the committee members to make an informed decision on the subject matter.

A lot of sacrifices were made to deliver this budget considering the fact that Members are busy preparing for the upcoming party primaries. In view of it, allow me to recognize and appreciate various stakeholders who played key roles. Let me start with the committee members for their commitment and sacrifices they made to interrogate and deliver this supplementary budget. I also thank the County Assembly administration for facilitating the committee to finalize on the matter. Finally, the committee is equally grateful to the staff who participated in the process to provide their technical input and support.

It is therefore my pleasant duty and privilege, on behalf of the Committee on Budget and Appropriation to table this report and recommend it to the House for adoption.

Hon. Speaker, sir, the Committee sought to establish the justification for the supplementary budget and made the following findings and observation;

**Hon. Speaker** (Hon. N. Mutai): Hon. Haron Kirui, we have a point of order from Hon. J. Kelong.

**Hon. J. Kelong:** Hon. Speaker, Sir, can our chair send this document to our gadgets so that we can follow along?

**Hon. Speaker** (Hon. N. Mutai): Hon. Kirui.

**Hon. H. Kirui:** Hon. Speaker, Sir, I had instructed my secretariat to send it to the Members. I do not know if they have done so.

**Hon. Speaker** (Hon. N. Mutai): Hon. H. Kirui, it has been sent. I have just confirmed it.

**Hon. H. Kirui:** Hon. Speaker, Sir, thank you. I request Hon. J. Kelong to turn on data on his phone and look at the document now.

I was going on with the justification for the supplementary budget. Hon. Speaker, sir, the Committee sought to establish the justification for the supplementary budget and made the following findings and observation;

First, the supplementary budget seeks to budget unspent balances brought down from the FY 2020/2021 amounting to Ksh. 335, 367, 172.

Secondly, it seeks to budget unspent balances from conditional grants by National government for Covid 19 response and Youth polytechnics amounting to Ksh. 24,306,279 and Ksh. 24,257,347 respectively

It seeks to budget for New and unspent balances from loans and grants by development partners amounting to Ksh. 280,226,705

It also seeks to budget for pending bills and special programmes

### **CLARIFICATIONS AND RESPONSES FROM THE CECM FINANCE**

The committee sought clarification of the CECM finance on the salient issues which arose during processing of the document.

The following are the salient issues and CECM for Finance responses.

1. The Supplementary budget was unsupported. Therefore, CEC for Finance was required to provide explanatory and sufficient reasons necessitating the supplementary budget being sought.

2. The CECM was required to submit up to date (as at 8<sup>th</sup> February 2022) expenditure report for all the departments.
3. *The CECM was required to provide supportive explanation to demonstrate that the following new budgetary allocations were unforeseen and unavoidable:*

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I have elaborated the justification and the need for the Supplementary Budget and engage my Committee on the need the need to have this Supplementary Budget.

I request Hon. L. Kirui to Second. Thank you.

**Hon. Speaker** (Hon. N. Mutai): Hon. Leonard Kirui.

**Hon. L. Kirui:** Hon. Speaker, I rise to second this Motion on the Bomet County Supplementary Budget. The Chair has elaborated much on this Supplementary Budget and has stated much pertaining to the changes that were expected in the supplementary budget. He has even gone further to explain the responses from the Executive and mainly from the County Executive Committee Member (CECM) Finance.

As he stated, being a Member of the Committee on Budget and Appropriation, the first thing that we looked at is whether there was a need for this supplementary budget. It is clear that in this budget one of the main reasons is to factor in some of the revenues that were not there in the main budget. It has been stated clearly that there were unspent expenditure balances for the year 2020/2021 which amounted to Kshs. 335 Million.

Hon. Speaker, that alone has indicated the need for the supplementary budget. Secondly, is the consideration of the unspent balances on the conditional grants. There are some grants which were not factored in for instance in the department of medical services there was a grant on the nutrition which must then be factored in this supplementary budget before it is spent. All that justifies why the need for the supplementary budget.

On top of that, there is a section that allows the executive to budget on the unforeseen activities and the Committee asked the executive whether there was a need for any unforeseen activity that arose and from the response, the Committee was satisfied that there were unforeseen situations. Once we are done with this, we need to up our game in terms of oversight. However, we almost questioned the Kshs. 157 Million which was indicated as the amount for special programmes.

However, we asked them to supply us with a list but we got satisfied. We did not have the authority to deny them such plans but ours involves carrying out oversight and ensure that the funds are used accordingly.

Hon. Speaker, the beauty about this supplementary budget is that, we have had complaints about the unpaid expenses to the contractors. The budget has included the pending bills. By the time we approve this budget, the pending bills amounting to Kshs. 148 Million and there are those factored in the other departments. We believe that it will be an answer to the hue and cry of the many contractors.

The second issue is about the unpaid amounts to the interns. There has been a statement sought by Hon. M. Chepkirui on the status of the unpaid interns. There is an additional Kshs. 17 Million that will totally amount to Kshs. 26 Million. Out of that, the issues on the internship programmes will be sorted.

Hon. Speaker, in conclusion, there have been complaints about some diseases that requires vaccinations. In this supplementary budget, there is an additional Kshs. 5 Million that will speed up the vaccination program. On the same note, there is a problem with the cattle dips. An additional Kshs. 7 Million has been set aside to operationalize the cattle dips. One of these dips is one in my ward called Kapisimba Cattle Dip. I believe this budget will enable it to be operationalized.

The other beauty about this supplementary is about the bursaries. The school calendar changed because of Covid-19. We can have two school calendars in one financial year. This budget has factored in an additional Kshs. 36.4 Million meant for bursaries. Therefore, by May during the first term, the students will get their bursaries.

Finally, there was some allocation given later and it was not captured in the assembly's budget. Therefore, it was necessary because the Controller of Budget would not approve if it is not captured in the budget. Time is also not on our side and we will be forced to make the necessary adjustments.

I wish to be in record that I second the Motion. I request the honourable Members to support.

*Question of the Motion proposed*

**Hon. Speaker** (Hon. N. Mutai): Hon. Members, the Motion is now open for debate. Hon. Kelong.

**Hon. R. Kelong:** Hon. Speaker, I also wish to support the Motion of the Supplementary Budget. While I support it, I also wish to comment on some of the things that I have observed. Additional amounts to various departments have been granted. This is because so many projects were not completed. So many things were not done in the previous budgetary allocation. If you look at some of our Wards in this allocations, there is Kshs. 77 Million meant for that fully covered some parts of this county. They got money for water pumps. Then we have added another Ksh. 77 million.

*Hon. L. Kirui rose on a point of order*

**Hon. L. Kirui:** Hon. Speaker, is it in order for Hon. Kelong to mislead the House that it was an addition. From the report, it is not additional but money which lapsed in the other financial year. So it was just brought forward to this financial year and it is conditional that it cannot be taken anywhere.

**Hon. Speaker** (Hon. N. Mutai): Hon. Kelong.

**Hon. J. Kelong:** Mr. Speaker, if you use the word ‘additional’, it means you have added some money. If you look at things like the purchase of land, you want to know whose pieces of land were purchased so that we can add money. If we look at education department, that is a department that has suffered so much. ECD centres which were constructed were never paid. We are now moving Ksh. 40 million so that we start constructing new ones. Are we sure this is going to be paid? So, something should be done in the near future so that when we set a budget and the plan is there, then it should be done. I am requesting chair budget to make a follow-up.

Concerning the ECD centres that are going to be done, we had requested that we complete those ones which were done half way. So Ksh. 40 million we are giving them will not be enough

because we have about 71 ECD centres supposed to be completed. Otherwise, I stand to support this supplementary budget but something should be done in future. Thank you.

**Hon. Speaker** (Hon. N. Mutai): Hon. Ambrose.

**Hon. A. Koech:** Thank you Hon. Speaker for giving me this opportunity to give an input to this supplementary budget. As much as Hon. Kelong has said, we see that the budget was passed and we are almost to the last quarter of the year yet there is nothing tangible in our Wards that has been done. Still people talk of heavy bills they are paying for something not done. There are contractors also who have not been paid. When we try to make follow-ups in our wards, you find that these people are not in their offices while some operate from hotels; places not designated for execution of their duties. So, I really feel that as much as we are doing this supplementary budget, as an oversight body, we should compel the executive to bring all these people to us in one sitting so that they explain to us what they have done in every department. When we talk of Covid 19, the budget was intact because it was already passed. I think there is a big difference between the executive and us. They are somehow disconnected and these disconnects should be connected by us. I have already seen that economic planning is given a whopping Ksh. 357 million. I do not know whether we need that much money in that department. What much is being done in the department of finance apart from being service provider to other ministries to continue working? So the executive is having a lot of problems which are actually bringing down the government of the day. If the ECDs started in 2013 have not been completed and other projects still not complete, and yet bills are still pending, we should be able to stand and demand for a progress. I support supplementary budget estimates for the year 2021-2022. Thank you.

**Hon. Speaker** (Hon. N. Mutai): Hon. Marcella.

**Hon. M. Chepkirui:** Thank you Hon speaker, I would like to appreciate the chair of this committee, Hon Haron. I stand to support the motion. Looking at the document, there is Ksh. 4 million for youth employment and reinforcement. Since we came to this County Assembly, it was one financial year when did allocation of the same. We are aware that these are our youths and they need to be represented. Under the governor's youths and sports, there is a tournament the governor is going to organize that will assist our youths. Hon Kelong has talked about education and I am very proud of it because there is allocation of Ksh.36.4 million under the

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bursary. When it comes to the issue of interns, there is a statement I sought from this house Mr Speaker, kindly protect me from the noise.

**Hon. Speaker** (Hon. N. Mutai): Hon. A. Maritim, you should have created time earlier to get some clarification from the chair...

**Hon. M. Chepkirui**: Mr. Speaker that the issue of...

*Hon. A. Maritim rises on a point of order*

**Hon. Speaker** (Hon. N. Mutai): What is your point of order hon. Maritim?

**Hon. A. Maritim**: Hon. Speaker, I think we have a right in the constitution to consult, I could have only done it in a low tone. I thought it was in a low tone.

**Hon. Speaker** (Hon. N. Mutai): You were very loud Hon. Maritim.

**Hon. A. Maritim**: Thank you Hon. Speaker I beg you to give me the permission to consult but in a low tone.

**Hon. M. Chepkirui**: Thank you Mr. Speaker for protecting me. On the issue of the interns in the county there is allocation of Ksh. 17 million of which carries out the basic wages. We still have a lot of interns who have not been paid for the last 6 months and I know this will be a good allocation. I stand to support the motion.

**Hon. Speaker** (Hon. N. Mutai): Hon. Deputy Speaker.

**Hon. W. Kiprotich**: Thank you Hon. Speaker. My observation at hand, no reservation adjourned other than to support it based on the fact that we're running short of the time for the benefit of this Supplementary Budget towards this county. From where I represent Mr. Speaker, Chepchabas ward; for instance, there is a lapse in terms of some ECDEs that are yet to be completed and then there's the issue of bursaries that have been mentioned by the chairman and as a result we also know from the past that a supplementary budget being the leaders of this County Assembly are to be addressed through Appropriation Bill. This Supplementary Budget



from the Executive is going to give us a leeway to also have all supplementary budget to be effected so that it can be able to assist us. Hon. Speaker I do support and let the House approve.

**Hon. Speaker** (Hon. N. Mutai): Thank you Hon. Kiprotich. Honourable members I have not given Hon. Aron a right of reply. Hon. Haron.

**Hon. H. Kirui:** Thank you Hon. Speaker for this opportunity. I thank all members for the fruitful debate and I want to assure the members that have noted the concerns by Hon. Kelong and Hon. Ambrose and all the other members who have spoken.

I want to ask Hon. Ambrose that we were talking about the other departments and I want to request this member that we are doing oversight even in sectoral levels. Let's do serious oversight. Hon. Ambrose was asking about economic planning money and that there's huge money which is used and he was saying there was service department. I wish to the request the chairperson of committee of finance and ICT to look into that matter and also the budget committee. Hon. Speaker I want to request the members that they approve this budget you have seen the justification the first budget is needed in May when the children will be going back to school. Without this Supplementary Budget there will be no bursaries for our children.

Secondly, the suppliers, the contractors and the hotels needs a lot of the money. We are killing the economy in the region if we don't approve this budget. We need the contractors to continue doing their work, some have even stopped the works because they have not been paid. The balance brought forward cannot be spent without being factored in the budget and the grants from national government for polytechnics. The only way to utilize grants from donors is through approving this Supplementary Budget.

I request the members to kindly approve this supplementary budget to allow the county government to run its operations smoothly. Thank you.

*Question on Supplementary Budget put and agreed to.*

**Hon. Speaker** (Hon. N. Mutai): Thank you. The motion on committee on Finance, ICT and Economic planning was deferred on 22<sup>nd</sup> of February 2022 and Hon. Ambrose was supposed to give a right of reply.

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**Hon. A. Koech:** Thank you Hon. Speaker for giving me this opportunity, let me recognize the presence of the chair Finance, ICT and Economic Planning who has also given me permission to do the same and the other members who are here and all the members of this Assembly.

Hon. Speaker I don't have much to say but only to urge the members that an ADP is a future plan for the next financial year and it's actually a map showing what's to be done in each and every ward and this county. So it's very important that we support this ADP. Hon. Serbai actually complained about the word imperative and I had to change it to say it's advisable that we adopt this report so that it actually becomes for future prosperity. It's also important for us to know as members of this House and members of different committees that in the plan we had issues of education and trade that are supposed to be accomplished. So it's very important that we also revisit this document and see what's supposed to be done where and at what time so that at least as we move ahead and finish up our CIDP plan because I this is the last ADP we are making before a new CIDP is brought to light. Hon. Speaker I urge this House to adopt this report so that the residents of Bomet shall continue accessing their services. I urge this House to adopt. Thank you.
